Plant Of The Month: Primrose

This colourful and versatile perennial is ideal for garden beds, borders, containers and for naturalising areas of the lawn.

These pretty plants are hardy and adaptable, making them easy to care for.

Primroses should be planted in lightly shaded areas with well-drained soil.

Set each plant about 6 — 12 inches apart, water thoroughly after planting and add a layer of mulch around the plants to help retain moisture.

Regular watering (particularly during periods of drought) and pruning will keep your primroses looking their best.

January's To Do List

Prune fruit trees and hardy foliage

Recycle your Christmas tree by shredding it for mulch

Keep putting out plenty of food and water for hungry birds

Cover the roots of newly arrived fruit trees and bare root roses in compost and place the container in a cool, frost-free place

Apply Westland Plant Rescue Bug Killer as a compost drench to control small flies in houseplant compost

Rock salt may keep paths ice-free but it can also scorch the leaves and roots of plants, so scatter with care and keep to a minimum

As long as they are firm and mould-free, bulbs such as tulips can still be planted in the garden
