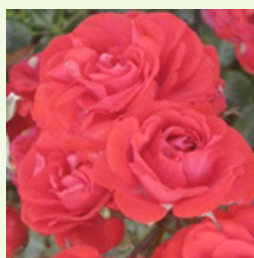
The Hilda Ogden Rose produces clusters of pink flowers, while the Jack Duckworth variety boasts a burst of golden and coral, and the

## To Do List

### Come Dine With Me

This month will see an array of fruits and vegetables reach their peak - so if you find yourself with a plethora of produce why not share with family, friends and neighbours, or cook up a home grown feast that is sure to impress!

### Water Watch

Now is the time to start conserving water. For best results, avoid regular sprinklings and opt instead to give tomatoes, cucumbers, aubergines and courgettes a generous daily drink during the hot weather.



### Off With Their Heads!

Deadhead perennials and bedding plants to help preserve their energy and keep them blooming throughout the summer and into autumn.

### Focus On: Sweet Peas

Prevent Sweet Peas from drying out by soaking the soil at least once a week and covering with a thick layer of mulch to retain moisture. Continue to pick daily to prevent the seed pods from developing (which will make the plant die out) — and use the beautifully scented petals to add a splash of fresh perfume to the home!



# Greenhouse Proud

One of the greatest joys of a greenhouse is the ability to walk through its doorway into a private world that allows you to switch off from life's worries, woes, and weather conditions.

If you're enticed by this comforting scenario, then the realm of the greenhouse boasts bountiful options...

## Structure

Greenhouses are made from metal (aluminium or galvanised steel) or wood (such as softwood or cedar). The cedar varieties can cost up to 75% more than their aluminium counterparts, but are generally more aesthetically pleasing, easier to equip, and offer better insulation. It's advisable to purchase the next size larger than you desire as it's surprising how easy it is to run out of space.

## Site

Choose a patch that's set away from buildings and fences that could shade out winter sun.

Planning permission is not usually necessary for an average sized greenhouse, but it is advisable to enquire with your local planning authority if formal permission is required. It is also wise to inform your neighbours of your greenhouse plans as these may interfere with their view.

## Extras

Very few greenhouses have enough ventilation, so avoid overheating by ordering adequate windows and air vents. Safety glass is also available as an optional extra, and should be specified when ordering. If you only wish to use your greenhouse for plants such as cucumber, tomatoes and peppers, then vertical full-glazed walls are preferable to partly-clad sloping types.

## Heating

There is a wide range of heating equipment that will ensure young seedlings and plants stay frost-free. The cheapest option is to use paraffin heaters, however if you plan a getaway, it's vital that you arrange for a friend or neighbour to top up the reservoir in your absence. Another option is to use a gas heater, but as with the paraffin heater, it's important to keep in mind that water vapour will accumulate so adequate ventilation is necessary to avoid excessive condensation. The cleanest heating method is to use electricity. A 2kw thermostatically controlled electric fan heater will provide an even spread of heat and ensure a 3m x 2.4m (10' x 8') greenhouse stays frost-free. It can also be used without the heating element to circulate air in summer. When using electric heaters, it's important to ensure they are attached to a circuit breaker for safety.

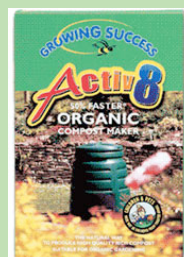
